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Payment Platform Redundancy Checklist

Have at least two reliable ways to receive client payments.

What does 'Backup Ready?' mean?

This column ensures you're not just thinking about alternatives; you've actually set them up and tested them. That means the account is verified, connected to your bank, and ready for real-world use. You should be able to send or receive money today, without scrambling to set it up during a crisis.

 Action: Print out your own checklist from the worksheets section at the back of this guide.

Hosting & Infrastructure Resilience

Don't get caught with your sites down.

Many hosting companies are U.S.-based or reliant on U.S. infrastructure. A systemic financial event could affect everything from CDN reliability to plugin licensing.

What does 'Backup Ready?' mean?

Your infrastructure setup should include an alternative host and a recent backup that can be restored elsewhere quickly. It means your domains are portable, and your licensing isn't tied to one provider.

 Action: Print out your own hosting & infrastructure checklist from the worksheets section.

Critical Plugin & SaaS Access

Track the services that power your business and what happens if they vanish.

Many tools and plugins are developed or hosted in the U.S. Their price, availability, or support may change rapidly in a downturn.

What is an "Exit Plan"?

It means you've identified a replacement tool, understand its pricing and features, and know how to migrate if needed. Better yet, you've tested the alternative.

 Action: List your critical plugins and SaaS tools. Prioritise finding at least one open-source or non-U.S.-based backup for each

Revenue Diversification Map

Don't rely on one income stream. Build multiple ways to earn, so if one dries up, you're not left scrambling.

When the U.S. economy takes a hit (and it will), client work can become unreliable. Companies slash marketing budgets. Projects are paused. Payments get delayed.

Having more than one stream of revenue isn't just smart, it's survival..

What counts as 'Backup or Scalable'?

This column tracks how resilient or adaptable a revenue stream is:

- **Backup:** Something you can lean on if your main income source dries up (e.g. teaching, white-label work, local SEO).
- **Scalable:** Something that can grow without direct time input (e.g. courses, templates, digital products).
- **Not scalable?** Then it needs extra protection — or to be supplemented.

💡 **Tip:** Your goal isn't to juggle ten income streams. It's to have at least one backup you can activate fast, and one scalable product that grows quietly over time.

🔧 **Action:** Create your own revenue diversification map using the worksheet provided.



Client Communication Continuity

Have a non-platform-dependent way to contact all your clients.

If Gmail, Slack, or other cloud tools are disrupted, you must still be able to inform your clients, manage emergencies, or update them on outage.

Tips

- Export all client contacts to an encrypted file monthly
- Draft a “service disruption” message template now
- Avoid overreliance on one big tech platform
